

President Ghani, politicians agree to quickly arm uprising forces to fight Taliban



KABUL: President Moham-
mad Agha Khan met with pro-
militarist Afghan political and jihad
leaders on Monday and discussed
the situation in the country, the
state, the Presidential Palace
(ARG) said in a statement.

The meeting with Afghan
leaders decided to equip public
uprising forces quickly in order
for them to fight the Taliban mil-
itaries. "In this meeting, a decision
was made on supporting the se-
curity forces, to safeguard and
keep the country safe from the
Taliban, strengthening and rapid
equipping of the public uprisings
against the enemy's attacks," the
statement read.

The President separately met
with Saqia Madaresh, Ustad
Maulana and Younus Qumani
among the country's national
personalities, according to a
statement issued from the Presi-
dential Press Office.

The meeting leaders and po-
litical figures decided to continue
full support to the republicanism
and the country's security and
defense forces resisting the coun-
try's enemy, in different parts of
the country.

This comes after public upris-
ings in the criticized Kabul and
not providing enough support
to the frontlines, as Taliban milita-
ries are attacking the provinces in
the country.

Thousands flee to Kabul from embattled northern provinces

Many of the families are now living in tents, in the heat of summer, in Sar-e-Shamali and Kharkhania areas in Kabul.

Most of these internally displaced people (IDPs) fled to Kabul from Kunduz, Takhar and

Some of these families say they were forced to flee their homes due to recent conflict in their provinces, and left all their belongings behind.

These families use only tents for shelter. Dozens of children are among the displaced.

There was a lot of terror in the city of Kunduz, and the bodies were lying on the roads. The Taliban were very brutal and mad, and they were killing people their shields," Rahmadi said, as quoted by Ariana News TV.
