

Grealish 'different to every player' in Man City squad as £100m signing heaps praise on Guardiola's tactics



Jack Grealish believes he is unlike any other player in the Manchester City squad as he says that he can bring something different to Pep Guardiola's English top-flight title winners.

Grealish agreed for City on Thursday in a deal that made him the most expensive British player of all time.

He now joins a group of attacking talent like Kevin De Bruyne, Raheem Sterling, Phil Foden and Riyad Mahrez, but Grealish is confident that he will do something that others in City's squad do not.

"I'm different to every player in this squad," Grealish said at

his introductory press conference.

"Raheem and wingers can go and beat Ronaldo in an out and out dribbler. Phil has a bit of everything."

"I feel I can bring a lot to the team and that's what the manager has bought me here for. Whether I'm a winger or an 11, like I will feel I can bring a lot."

"When I watch City there's so much attacking talent that can do everything, they're changing positions constantly."

"Even the few days I've been signed do not mean success, but it's only seeing the work [Guardiola does it is inspiring to him]."

"I feel like I can bring a lot to the team, the manager will choose what position to play me in."

Grealish on Guardiola: "In addition to seeing his tactics are out of this world. Grealish had plenty of hard work to say about his new manager."

Team GB still too white and suburban, says Sport England board member



Team GB is not representative of the diversity of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, with too many sports still dominated by white, suburban people, says a board member of the Olympic Games.

For example, Team GB's two most successful athletes, two-time world champion, received £24,000 in the last Olympic cycle from UK Sport, yet provided only two medals - one silver and one bronze.

US Open: Andy Murray gains direct entry into main draw after Stan Wawrinka withdrawal

Andy Murray has gained direct entry into the main draw of the US Open after former champion Stan Wawrinka withdrew because of his ongoing recovery from last year's injury.

Former world No 1 and 2012 champion Murray was the first player on the alternate list after he missed out on the initial main draw field in July.

Wawrinka, champion in 2010 at Flushing Meadows, has not competed since March.

Murray pulled out of the site of the Olympics with a knee injury, but he is now in the main draw.

The 34-year-old has in the past reached the quarter-finals in the Career Finals at the Tokyo Olympics before pulling out of the

main draw.

The 20th-time major singles champion has now opted out of the tournament in Cincinnati, where he is a two-time champion, to focus on preparing for the US Open.

"Dear fans, I wanted to share with you that I am taking a bit longer to recover and recuperate after quite a taxing journey from Australia to Tokyo," Djokovic said on Twitter.

"Sadly, that means I won't be ready to compete in Cincinnati this year so I'll turn my focus and attention to US Open and spend some more time with family. See Tokyo."
