Turkey declares ‘disaster areas’ as wildfire death toll rises



Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has declared parts of central Turkey regions by wildfires as “disaster areas” with the death toll from the fires rising to six after two forest workers were killed.

Fires across Turkey since Wednesday have burned down forests, encroaching on villages and tourism destinations and forcing people to evacuate.

Minister of Agriculture and Forestry Bekir Pakdemirli said on Saturday that 18 of 16 fires that broke out amid strong winds and scorching heat have been brought under control.

A latest fire in people have died in villages in the north of the main. Both towns are located on the Mediterranean and are tourist destinations.

Health Minister Fahrettin Koca said 400 people affected by the fire in Manisa were discharged from hospitals and 10 were still receiving treatment. In Marmaris, 159 people were treated.

and one person was still undergoing treatment for burns.

He also expressed his sympathy for the people whose homes were lost and said the government would provide compensation for those affected.

President Erdogan was visiting affected areas on Saturday, inspecting from helicopters.

Erdogan declared the regions affected by the forest fires “disaster areas” in a statement on Twitter. “We will continue to take all necessary steps to help our citizens and improve their living conditions,” said Erdogan.

Speaking from the town of Manisa, in the south of Turkey, Erdogan said at a press conference later on Saturday that while Ankara was not looking to

well as dozens of helicopters and troops were assisting the firefighting efforts.

Speaking from Antalya, At Izzet’s Road Sector said there are still active fires in at least 10 locations in Turkey.

Erdogan said that huge efforts are in place to bring the fires under control. “It is still very difficult ... fire keep erupting,” he said.

Wildfires are common in Turkey’s Mediterranean and Aegean regions during the arid summer months.

Myanmar army ruler pledges elections, ASEAN cooperation

The army seized power in a coup in 2021 from the civilian government led by Aung San San Kyi after her ruling party won elections.

Min Aung Hlaing said the military would work with ASEAN to promote peace and stability in the region.

The country’s military has been accused of human rights abuses and of being a threat to the region’s stability.

Since the coup, military authorities have faced protests and strikes that have paralyzed parts of the country.

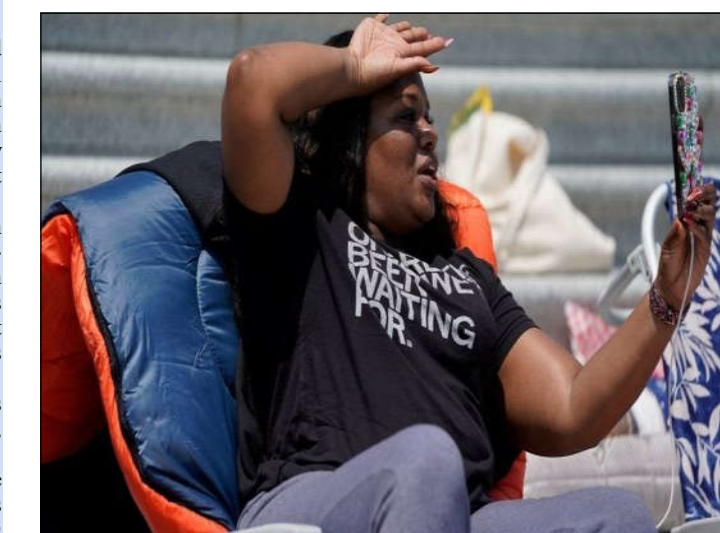
